February 14, 2021— Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Do Everything for the Glory of God

What is your true calling in life? Is it to help other people? Is it to develop the talents that God gave you? Is it to love and support your family? While all of these may be true for us, we don't often recognize that our deepest calling, or vocation, is to give glory to the God who creates, saves, and sanctifies us. In the First Letter to the Corinthians Paul exhorts us to "do everything for the glory of God." The one person who did this better than anyone else was Jesus Christ. It comes as no surprise that Paul also tells us to "be imitators of Christ." How did Jesus give glory to God? He sought not his "own benefit but that of the many, that they might be saved." Today's Gospel gives us a challenging example from Jesus' life. Jesus saves a leper from the stigma and suffering of leprosy. Afterward the leper joyfully returns to the community and tells everyone the good news about what Jesus did for him. As a result, Jesus finds that he now experiences the exclusion that the leper had once known. he can no longer "enter a town openly" and must remain "outside in deserted places."

Imitators of Christ

Most of us will probably never cure anyone from leprosy or any other disease. How, then are we to imitate the Christ who worked such wonders? We are called to give glory to God by using our own gifts with courage and generosity, as Jesus did. We are called to seek not our "own benefit but that of the many," risking our own pride, status, time, money, or pleasure for the common good. We are called to tell everyone the good news about what Christ does for us—and through us—every day.

Then everything we do will be for the glory of God.




Sunday, February 14, 2021

Reading I: Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46— The leper will dwell apart, making an abode outside the camp. **Responsorial:** *Psalm* 32–I turn to you,

Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation.

Reading II: 1 Cor. 10:31-11:1—Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.

Gospel: *Mark* 1:40-45—The leprosy left him, and he was made clean.



6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this morning's Gospel we see that Jesus' ministry is all about inclusion. He felt that all people were meant to be in community, not in isolation. Everyone belonged.

Jesus was there for the leper as he was for so many other people isolated from community. He reached out and

touched them. In place of isolation, he gave companionship. In place of rejection, he gave acceptance. In place of illness, he gave healing. No one was beyond the reach of his mercy and compassion.



A Story—The Old Man & His Grandson Once upon a time there was a very old man, whose eyes had become dim, his ears dull of hearing, his knees trembled, and when he sat at the table, he could hardly hold the spoon, and he spilt the broth upon the table-

cloth or let it run out of his mouth.

His son and his son's wife were disgusted at this, so the old grandfather at last had to sit in the corner behind the stove, and they gave him his food in an earthenware bowl, and not even enough of it. He used to look toward the table with his eyes full of tears. Once, too, his trembling hands could not hold the bowl, and it fell to the ground and broke. The young wife scolded him, but he said nothing and only sighed. Then they bought him a wooden bowl for a few halfpence, out of which he had to eat.

They were once sitting down for dinner when the little grandson of four years of age began to gather together some bits of wood upon the ground. "What are you doing there?" asked the father. "I am making a little trough," answered the child "for father and mother to eat out of when I am big." The man and his wife looked at each other for a while, and presently began to cry. They then took the old grandfather to the table, and henceforth always let him eat with them, and likewise said nothing if he did spill a little of anything. —*Grimm's Fairy Tale*

Conclusion

You and I are surrounded by people in our community much like the leper in the Gospel and the old man in the story. They are on the fringes of society, not fully included in the mainstream of life. Like Jesus, we have to reach out to them, touch their lives in some way and make them feel that they count and that they belong.

The drive-thru distribution of Holy Communion at Star of the Valley is continuing this **Sunday** at the Msgr. Fahey Parish Center





Thoughts from Catholic Musician/ Composer/Retreat Leader— Sarah Hart

Exactly one year ago today, I was visiting my parents in Ohio. I have not seen them in person since.
