Divine Mercy Sunday

Divine Mercy Sunday

When Pope St. John Paul II canonized Sister Faustina, he also, on the same day, surprised the entire world by establishing Divine Mercy Sunday as a feast day for the entire Church. According to the Pope, all Masses said on this day, the Sunday after Easter, were to be in honor of the Divine Mercy. Our Lord told Sister Faustina, "I desire that the Feast of Mercy... be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter... The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion (in a state of grace on this day) shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment."

The Image of the Divine Mercy

Jesus appeared to Sister Faustina with rays of red and pale light streaming from the area around His heart. His hand was raised in blessing, recalling the scene of Easter Sunday night (see John 20: 19-23).

He asked Sister Faustina to have this vision painted along with the words, "Jesus, I Trust in You!"

He presented this image to remind people to trust in His mercy, and to come to Him for mercy:

I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image with the words: Jesus, I trust in you.

Jesus explained that the rays represented the blood and water which flowed from His pierced side and taught Sister Faustina the prayer:

O blood and water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in you.




Sunday, April 11, 2021 Scripture Readings

Reading I: Acts 4:32-35—They were of one heart and mind.

Responsorial: *Psalm 118*—Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Reading II: 1 John 5:1-6—Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God.

Gospel: John 20:19-31—Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.



Second Sunday of Easter— Divine Mercy Sunday

In today's Gospel Jesus gifts his apostles and us with peace. Three times he says "Peace be with you." It is not a peace that the world gives, that is merely an absence of war. But the peace Jesus gives is serenity in the face of life. The gift is a sense of

calm knowing that Jesus is "My Lord and my God," I live in his presence and that there is nothing in this life that can separate me from him.

He then sends the apostles and us forth with the help of the Holy Spirit to foster that peace in ourselves, in one another, and in the world around us. "Receive the Holy Spirit." "As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

We foster that peace by showing compassion to people.

"We know that we love the children of God when we love God and obey his commandments." (1st Letter of St. John)

We foster that peace by respecting and being just to people.

"No one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they had everything in common. There was no needy person among them." (Acts)

We foster that peace by forgiving and reconciling with people.

"Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (John)

We foster that peace by uniting with people in freedom and in the pursuit of happiness.

"The community of believers was of one heart and mind." (Acts)

A Story

In 2005, Christo Brand, a South African man, received a call that every parent dreads; his son had died in an automobile accident. On his way to the hospital morgue, Christo received another phone call. A friend said: "I heard about your boy. It is a terrible thing when a parent has to bury a child. I understand how it feels because I lost my own son in the same way. I wish I could give you some strength to bear this."

While you may not recognize the name Christo Brand, you almost certainly will recognize the name of the caller: Nelson Mandela, the former president of South

Africa. What makes this story truly remarkable isn't that the former president called to console a relatively unknown countryman; rather, what makes this story incredible is that Christo Brand had been Mandela's prison guard for 12 years. By 2005 their relationship had become a friendship.

Mandela had an insight that changed the course of history and his wounded nation. He knew that the only way South Africa and the world could know peace was through a commitment to forgiveness and reconciliation.

Conclusion

People and our world are in great need of the peace that only the Lord can give. He has given it to us to foster and share in ourselves, in one another, and in our world.

Acts of Mercy Bring Peace

In a place where people were fearful and grieving, Jesus comes with greetings of peace. His message of peace is a refrain throughout the entire gospel passage. First, he greets the disciples, who are fearfully hiding, with peace. Then, he greets the doubtful Thomas with peace. His followers needed this message. They needed calm in their state of darkness.

This Sunday we observe Divine Mercy Sunday. It is an invitation to reflect on the many ways our world longs for God's mercy. It might be those who are in grief and full of anxiety, like the disciples in the gospel. It might be those in need of the corporal works of mercy. It might be those who are seeking healing. Whatever the need, we are called to reflect on how we can share Christ's peace with others through acts of mercy.

God's mercy and love for us is enduring. Indeed, He sent his Son to bring us redemption, the ultimate act of mercy. Let us imitate Jesus' example of peace. Where there is fear, doubt, or any need for compassion, let us bring the peace of Christ.

The Touch

The Gospel for the Second Sunday of Easter is John 20: 19-31. Thomas, a rather courageous and inquisitive disciple of Jesus in the Gospel of St. John, was absent when Jesus appeared to the disciples. While they were secluded in fear behind locked doors, Thomas was out and about. The Thomas episode is remarkable. He refuses to believe the testimony of his fellow disciples unless he touches the wounds of the Risen Jesus. One can only wonder why a Risen Jesus would still be wounded. Jesus appears to Thomas, blessing him with peace and the Spirit. Finally, Thomas exclaims Jesus as his Lord. Thomas came to see Jesus when he touched the wounds of Jesus.

Perhaps the first followers of Jesus understood Jesus to be risen in the woundedness of the poor and afflicted. As they fed the hungry, clothed the naked, comforted the sick and imprisoned, and welcomed the stranger, they

touched the wounds of the Risen Jesus. These wounds were and are the wounds of love.

Were you ever so tired, you ached from exhaustion? Were you ever wounded in attempting to help another person? Did your heart ever break as you experienced the suffering of another? These are your wounds, the signs of your loving care.

Thomas had the courage to touch the wounds of Jesus. The first followers had the courage to touch the wounds of the Risen One.

Blessed are you for touching the wounds of others with the love of your hearts and the deeds of your hands. Thank you for rising to the occasion to be the loving presence of Jesus to all. May the humility and simplicity of this beautiful and touching day be an inspiration to us as we humbly seek to touch the wounds of the Risen One in the suffering people of today.


