Not Me!

No matter what we might think our role or place is within the fold, each of us has some responsibility to be a shepherd in daily living. In the smallest acts of justice, charity, or compassion we are living out the call of our covenant with the Lord: to be God's voice, God's presence, God's caring and guiding hand in the world.

Yes, You!

The apostle Paul tells us that in Christ we all have access in one Spirit to the Father. With this tremendous and wonderful gift comes the responsibility to make it a gift again for the life of the world. As Christ made peace through the blood of his cross, as he reconciled earth with heaven, we are called to continue that peace-making, reconciling work day by day. Each week we gather with Jesus Christ as the apostles do in today's Gospel. We pray in the Eucharistic Prayer: "May this sacrifice, which has made our peace with you, advance the peace and salvation of the world." Each of us, baptized into the one Body of Christ, saved by the blood of his cross that we share in one cup, are chosen and called for the mission of shepherding in his name. If we take but a moment to look around, we can easily see that there are many places where people are like sheep without a shepherd. Are our hearts, filled with the presence of the Good Shepherd, moved with pity for them? More important, are our lives moved to action?

Scripture Readings

Reading I: *Jeremiah 23:1-6*—I will gather the remnant of my flock and appoint shepherds for them.

Responsorial: *Psalm 23*—

The Lord is my shepherd; there is

nothing I shall want.

Reading II: *Ephesians 2:13-18*—You who were once far off have become near by the blood of Christ.

Gospel: *Mark 6:30-34*—They were like sheep without a shepherd.

Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

“When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.” (Mark 6:34)

In this passage from the Gospel of Mark, Jesus starts by calling his apostles to a deserted place to rest. But when they reach their destination, they see a vast crowd who followed them to this place. Jesus has a change of plans. His heart is moved with pity, and he begins to teach them many things.

It is powerful when we hear about Jesus’ heart being moved. This very real human feeling is something that we have all experienced. Whether it be a joyful occasion or an encounter with suffering, our heart being moved may be a sign of God’s direction. Indeed, in the gospel it prompts Jesus to action. How are we prompted to respond when our hearts are moved?

This week, let us focus more intently on what moves our heart. May God help us to listen more closely to it, and may we use it to help us to practice stewardship.

Our **Neighbor-to-Neighbor** program sponsors two rooms at Catholic Charities' Caritas House, being built in Santa Rosa, hosts our annual Christmas Basket Program, and stocks Nick's Pantry in the Msgr. Fahey Parish Center.

During the pandemic we hosted a drive-through Christmas Giveaway. The "Pandemic Version" of our usual Christmas Basket Program was very successful thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who organized, planned, set up, stood out in the cold, and made special deliveries. 91 families were invited and those able to attend were given a special Safeway Gift Card, with a higher monetary value than usual, since we couldn't invite them inside or give them food or gifts last year. 58 children at the Catholic Charities Family Support Shelter also received Target gift cards. Nick's Pantry was open during the pandemic to serve some very grateful guests.

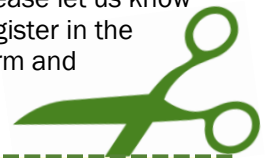
Missals in the Divine Mercy Alcove

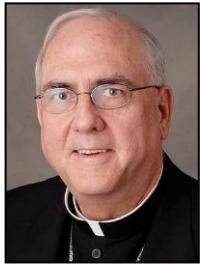
