Outsiders & Insiders

Since the Second Vatican Council, Catholics have been led to a deeper awareness of the universal call to holiness rooted in baptism. This call to holiness, that we once thought we alone possessed, we now know to be true of all the baptized. Division among those who have followed Jesus has been around since the very beginning of Christianity. Jesus' apostles complained to him about others, outside their circle, who were driving out demons in the name of the Lord. Jesus set them straight by telling them that "whoever is not against us is for us." Imagine what the world would be like if we were able to lay down the divisions that exist among us and work together, inspired by God, to bring peace and justice to those who are in need.

Unity & The Call To Holiness

In John's Gospel, the Lord utters a long final discourse in which he prays that his disciples and all who follow him will become one. It is a sad reality that in a world marked by division, even those who are baptized into Christ Jesus frequently cannot come together in unity to work toward building God's reign. We often expect the leaders of the Chirstian churches to do the work of Christian unity. In reality, that work begins within our homes, neighborhoods, schools, civic organizations, and places of business. In today's Gospel from Mark, the Lord tells his followers that they should cut away any part of their bodies that leads them into sinfulness. The Church—the Body of Christ—sometimes needs to take a look at itself to see if there is anything that needs to be cut away.

Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink because you belong to Christ, amen, I say to you, will surely not lose his reward." (Mark 9:41)

This Friday, October 1, is the Memorial of **St. Thérèse of Lisieux**, one of the four female doctors of the Church. St. Thérèse was known for her little way. Aware that she was not going to be a saint like St. Thomas Aquinas or St. Augustine, yet ardently desiring sainthood, Thérèse confessed that "God would never inspire me with desires which cannot be realized; so, in spite of my littleness, I can hope to be a saint." And so Thérèse pursued heaven by doing the smallest, humblest of tasks, with a great love for Christ: "Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smallest right and doing it all for love" (Story of a Soul).

In today's Gospel, Jesus acknowledges this little way. Even the smallest, seemingly mundane tasks, when done with love, prove to be a path to heaven: "Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink because you belong to Christ, amen, I say to you, will surely not lose his reward" (Mark 9:41). It seems so easy, and yet, Jesus quickly warns that this reward requires great sacrifice. While the Lord does not demand tremendous gestures from us, he does call us to radical, sacrificial love. Let us never miss a single opportunity to live a life of charity and generosity.

Priesthood Sunday, however, specifically honors priests, without whom the Mass could not be offered and Sacraments could not be celebrated.

October is the Month of The Holy Rosa

By tradition, the Catholic Church dedicates each month of the year to a certain devotion. The month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary, one of the best known of all Catholic devotions. October includes the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary (October 7).

The best way to celebrate the month is, of course, to pray the Rosary.

But why is it that on October 7th the Catholic Church celebrates the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary?

On October 7, 1571, a great victory over the mighty Turkish fleet was won by Catholic naval forces primarily from Spain, Venice, and Genoa under the command of Don Juan of Austria. It was the last battle at sea between "oared" ships, which featured the most powerful navy in the world, a Muslim force with between 12,000 to 15,000 Christian slaves as rowers.

The patchwork team of Catholic ships was powered by the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Knowing that the Christian forces were at a distinct material disadvantage, the holy pontiff, St. Pope Pius V called for all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory.

We know today that the victory was significant, prevented the Islamic invasion of Europe, and evidenced the Hand of God working through Our Lady.

At the hour of victory, St. Pope Pius V, who was hundreds of miles away at the Vatican, is said to have gotten up from a meeting, went over to a window, and exclaimed with supernatural radiance: "The Christian fleet is victorious!" and shed tears of thanksgiving to God. What you may not know is that one of three admirals commanding the Catholic forces at Lepanto was Andrea Doria.

He carried a small copy of Mexico's Our Lady of Guadalupe into battle. This image is now enshrined in the Church of San Stefano in Aveto, Italy.

At Lepanto, the Victory over the Muslims was won by the faithful praying the Rosary. Even though they had superior numbers, the Turks really were overmatched. Blessed Padre Pio, the Spiritual Father of the Blue Army, said: "The Rosary is the weapon," and how right he was!

The Battle of Lepanto was at first celebrated liturgically as "Our Lady of Victory."

Later, the feast of October 7th was renamed "Our Lady of the Rosary" and extended throughout the Universal Church by Pope Clement XI in 1716 (who canonized Pope Pius V in 1712).

And with that we are back to Fatima, Portugal where Our Lady, when asked her name, said: "I am the Lady of the Rosary." At Fatima, Our Lady taught us to pray the Rosary **every day**.

Heaven presented its peace plan at Fatima and truly gave us hope for the world.

In this month of October, let us consider the beautiful prayer of the Rosary as a means that we, too, can use to draw closer to God by meditating on the great mysteries of our salvation.

Our Lady of the Rosary, Pray for us!

May your choices reflect your hopes, not your fears.

The 6 Ps of Planning

Sadly, it's that time of the year again where local Sonoma County residents ponder the thought of another fire. Many of us were evacuated around this time last year. Although we hope nothing major affects our beloved county, it doesn't hurt to be prepared. We ask that everyone take a moment to go over the 6 Ps of planning.

- People/Pets: Have a plan for your family and animals. How will you leave and where will you go?
- Papers: It is important to be aware of where important documents stay. Rather than shuffling around for important papers, keep them in the same location that can be grabbed at a moment's notice.
- Prescriptions: Eyeglasses, medicine, etc. Take note that if you evacuate you might not be able to return home for a few days. Be sure you have access to all your required health related items.
- Pictures: This includes any irreplaceable memorabilia. Take into account everything you deem replaceable or irreplaceable. Rather than making the decision on your signed baseball during evacuation, have a plan for what you might want to bring with you ahead of time to expedite your departure.
- Personal: Any necessary items stored electronically. Make sure to upload any necessary documents to a cloud service or have it on a removable storage device that is easy to access.

Plastics: These are your credit cards, ATM cards and other forms of monetary value. Be sure to have a plan for your money when the time comes. You might not be returning home any time soon and can incur some expenses while evacuated.
