Stolen Thunder

By the time the Gospels were written, James and John, sons of Zebedee (sons of “thunder”) were revered leaders of the Christian community. It is common to place the failings of the early Christians on the shoulders of their leaders to illustrate a point about discipleship, and perhaps to comfort them with the fact that Jesus chose common, flawed humans to spread the Good News. It must have seemed odd that these two, already honored and revered, were chastised by Jesus when they requested positions of honor: Jesus, stole their thunder, and in the Gospel he likewise steals the thunder of the others who get indignant at James and John. Jesus reminds us that it is in the humility of service that we come to know the reign of God in our midst.

God's Work of Salvation

God's work of salvation is the focus of this weekend's readings. From the prophetic event of Isaiah to Jesus' understanding of the human condition in Mark, God is in control. There may be failings and misunderstandings along the way. We may move away from God, but at our conversion, God leads us back. Like James and John, we may let greed and power blur our vision of what Jesus wants us to know about the Kingdom; but tirelessly we are taught and re-taught what life in the Kingdom will be. Jesus has paid our ransom to ensure that we will share in the Kingdom. It is not unusual to think of Jesus' ransom as a punishment that he endured. However, it is more accurate, and more like Jesus, for us to recognize this ransom as God's gift to us.

Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45)

Moments before James and John boldly approached Jesus and requested, or rather, demanded, that they be given a seat of honor, Jesus had warned them of his impending Passion. It is clear, by their request, that James and John do not comprehend the meaning of the Cross, nor do they fully understand what it means to follow Jesus. Enchanted by their worldly idea of Jesus' Kingdom, they ask Jesus for a share in his glory. Jesus informs them that they do not understand what they are asking, that to share in his glory, they must be willing to suffer with him.

Today's Gospel concludes with Jesus reminding his twelve apostles once again that God's power looks different from the power of the world. The power of God is not lorded over people or used to oppress people. Instead the power of God is evidenced in sacrifice. To be great is not to have worldly power; to be great in the eyes of God is to be willing to generously serve others. Are we more attached to our status and to symbols of greatness and wealth? Or are we willing to give of ourselves—our time, talent, and treasure—so as to serve the Body of Christ?

Mass Servers Needed at SOV

Being a server, or altar server, is an official ministry of the Church. As such, a minister is placing his or her/self at the service of the Church. A server is a lay assistant to a member of the clergy during a Christian liturgy.

An altar server (aka an acolyte) is responsible for setting up the altar for Mass and assists the priest. They may also serve as a Eucharistic Minister, distributing Holy Communion at Mass.

Each server will be required to set up the church for Mass.

Saint John Paul II


Our Gospel [last Sunday], blesses those who hear the word of God and observe it. In this regard, I would like to speak about the response of the Polish people to the word proclaimed by **St. John Paul II**. The power of the Polish Communist state, and behind that, the power of the Soviet Union, is what John Paul faced at the beginning of the 1980s. But he was practiced in the art of facing down oppressive political forces, having grown up under Nazism and Communism.

He spoke of God, of human rights, of the dignity of the individual frightening at every turn, his handlers worried about diplomatic repercussions. As he spoke, the crowds got bigger and more enthusiastic. This went beyond mere Polish nationalism. At one gathering, the millions of people gathered began to chant "We want God! We want God!" over and over for fifteen minutes.

There was no controlling this power, born of the confidence that God's love is more powerful than any of the weapons of the empires of the world, from crosses to nuclear bombs. This is, of course, why Communist officialdom tried vehemently to stop John Paul II. But there is no chaining the Word of God!






Crossing the Threshold of Hope

Telephone Number Dialing Change

Get your dialing fingers ready Sonoma—they're about to get a little busier. That's because, beginning **October 24**, some California area codes—including Sonoma County's—will be moving to a 10-digit dialing system.

To complete all local calls, callers will need to dial the area code—for example, 707—followed by the telephone number. Unlike previously, the area code and the seven-digit phone number must be dialed regardless of whether it is a local or long-distance call.

After October 24, failing to dial the full 10 digits will result in a recording informing the caller that their call cannot be completed as dialed.

Under the new system, telephone numbers will remain the same and it will have no effect on charges. Callers will continue to dial 1 before the area code for long-distance calls.

Other emergency services, such as 911, can still be reached with their three-digit code.

All are welcome at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, **October 25**.

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


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
