Is it or isn't it?

As Jesus rightly tells Pilate, his kingdom is not of this world. It isn't. But Christians believe that, in Jesus Christ, his kingdom has broken into the world, and continues to be made manifest in the world until the final day of his glorious return. A very early Christian term, autobasilea, was

used to say that Jesus was the "kingdom-in-himself" on earth. As we, the Church, celebrate this feast of Christ our King, we recall our own mission through baptism to be "Christ's-kingdom-in-ourselves" and to do our own part to continue introducing his reign wherever it is not yet a part of this world. A look back at our whole Church year from this final Sunday will show us that this reign in Christ is one of love, of proclaiming salvation, of healing, of forgiving and reconciling, of humble service, of selfgiving. We pray "Your kingdom come" because it isn't completely here yet, which is why we likewise pray "Your will be done" so that it might be.

"For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." (John 18:37)

Next Sunday begins the first week of Advent, and with it, the 2022 liturgical year. Today, on the final Sunday of the 2021 liturgical year, we are presented with the opportunity to reflect on the past 365 days.

Though perhaps not as tumultuous as 2020, 2021 still came with plenty of challenges and hardships. Once again, we witnessed suffering, brokenness, sin—tangible reminders that the world we are living in is not heaven. Synod 2021 2023

"There is no need to create another church, but to create a different church." —Pope Francis

Twenty-five members and neighbors of Star of the Valley Parish met at our first Synod meeting on Thursday, November 18. Our goal was to envision together a "different church."

Questions we considered:

- 1 Do you have friends or family who are no longer attending the Catholic Church? If so, what is keeping them away?
- 2 Do you feel that the Holy Spirit is inspiring you to speak at this meeting today? What are your thoughts?
- 3 How is God speaking to us today through those our Church often ignores, for example through women, young people, the elderly, divorced people, LGBT community, the poor, etc.?
- 4 What inhibits the local Church's listening to the laity? What might help it?

Some of the summary statements given:

- "We hope that the Church will turn from dogma and demands to love and acceptance, especially of those on the fringes of society."
- "We envision a Church that doesn't judge others but where all can find the love of God."
- "We hope for a different Church, one that undertakes the mission of inclusiveness, especially for youth, LGBT community, the divorced, in other words all God's children."
- "We admire the steps Pope Francis is taking to identify and address the issues facing our Church today.
- "The American Church seems to be building walls today, walls of exclusion. Pope Francis is trying to open up our Church. We want an open church, not a Church for the few."
- "There are no structures for the laity to make their voices heard in our diocese. There is a disassociation of the diocesan Administration from the Parishes."
