November 27/28, 2021— First Sunday of Advent

Advent ABCs

If motivation is the key to success, then the season of Advent starts our liturgical year out right by focusing our attention on the ultimate reason for our hope and all we do as Christians. The first reading and the Gospel reassure us that the Messiah will cover the earth in justice at the end of time. This may be a frightening prospect to those who are blameworthy, but to the Lord's "holy ones" it is a reason to "stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand."

The scriptures also reveal the ABCs of arriving at our goal. In the full text of today's psalm each verse starts with a successive letter of the Hebrew alphabet—from "A" to "Z." That made it easy to learn by heart the psalm's instruction on following God's way of faithful love. Today's New Testament scriptures also instruct us in what we must do "to be blameless in holiness... at the coming of our Lord Jesus."

"Come, Lord Jesus!"

We are to "be vigilant," expecting Christ to come into our lives at every moment. We are to "abound in love for one another," working constantly for the coming of Christ's love into our relationships and communities. And we are to "stand erect" and pray without fear for the coming of the end of time, when the Lord Jesus will come bringing perfect justice and peace. Christians in the first centuries of the church prayed the acclamation, "Come, Lord Jesus!" The Advent season invites us to enter into this spirit of hopeful expectation for the "advent" of Christ's reign. (**Come, Lord Jesus** *continues inside*)



Sunday, November 27/28, 2021 **Scripture Readings**

Reading I: Jeremiah 33:14-16-1 will raise up for David a just shoot. Responsorial: Psalm 25-To you, O Lord, I lift my soul.

Reading II: 1 Thessalonians 3:12-4:2 -May the Lord make you abound in love. Gospel: Luke 21:25-28, 34-36-Be vigilant at all times.

Today marks the beginning of the season

of Advent—a time during which we await the coming of the Lord, a time for us to reflect upon the darkness of sin and long for his Light to be born anew within our hearts.

And yet, as Advent precedes Christmas, it is also a season in which consumerism runs rampant. It becomes so easy for us to turn our attention to the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, the gifts that need to be wrapped and purchased, the cookies that need to be baked, the cleaning that needs to be done. Slipping into a mentality of comparison also becomes easy during this time of year - we compare our homes, budget, presents, even our lawn decorations to our neighbors and family members, measuring ourselves up to some invisible standard.

This sort of worldly distraction is exactly what Jesus warns us against in today's Gospel. This Advent may we pray to have the grace to slow down, to embrace this season of waiting, to see God in unexpected ways. May we seek to make the Light of Christ present to our neighbors who are experiencing darkness; may our generosity come in forms of joy, forgiveness, mercy, and peace, rather than neatly wrapped boxes; may we seek ways to spend time with the poor as we recall how our God chose to enter into the chaos of our lives - not as a rich, wealthy, powerful influencer - but as a poor, homeless, vulnerable child. -Jim Messa

Synod 2021 2023

"There is no need to create another church, but to create a different church." —Pope Francis

Twenty-five members and neighbors of Star of the Valley Parish met at our first Synod meeting on Thursday, November 18. Our goal was to envision together a "different church."

Questions we considered:

- 1 Do you have friends or family who are no longer attending the Catholic Church? If so, what is keeping them away?
- 2 Do you feel that the Holy Spirit is inspiring you to speak at this meeting today? What are your thoughts?
- 3 How is God speaking to us today through those our Church often ignores, for example through women, young people, the elderly, divorced people, LGBT community, the poor, etc.?
- 4 What inhibits the local Church's listening to the laity? What might help it?

Some of the summary statements given:

- "We hope that the Church will turn from dogma and demands to love and acceptance, especially of those on the fringes of society."
- "We envision a Church that doesn't judge others but where all can find the love of God."
- "We hope for a different Church, one that undertakes the mission of inclusiveness, especially for youth, LGBT community, the divorced, in other words all God's children."
- "We admire the steps Pope Francis is taking to identify and address the issues facing our Church today.
- "The American Church seems to be building walls today, walls of exclusion. Pope Francis is trying to open up our Church. We want an open church, not a Church for the few."
- "There are no structures for the laity to make their voices heard in our diocese. There is a disassociation of the diocesan Administration from the Parishes."
