Woe Is Me

Often, we think about the troubles in our lives and cry out, "Woe is me!" Like Job we might look around in despair at the misery in the world. Like Job's friends we might

look backward for something or someone on which to blame our suffering. We may decide that God-or we ourselves—must be to blame. The Gospel today offers a different perspective from which to view earthly suffering. Jesus looked forward in hope. He did not blame the sick and the possessed for their suffering, as many others did. And he did not give up hope, even though he knew he couldn't cure all the sickness in the world. Jesus tried neither to eliminate human suffering nor to explain it. He simply did what good he could do in the time that he had.

Look Forward In Hope

Above all, Jesus kept preaching the good news of the reign of God, a spiritual reality that triumphs over every form of suffering. This was his purpose. When we believe in this good news we may not be healed of physical illness or understand the reason for human suffering, but we do receive something much more valuable. We are healed of the sickness of despair and freed from the demons of guilt and blame. The Spirit energizes us to do what good we can do in the time that we have. With Paul we will want everyone to know about the healing, liberating reign of God.

Today's Scriptures encourage us to look forward in hope, to do what we can, and to preach the good news of the reign of God.

A Guide to Fat Tuesday, AKA Mardi Gras

Fat Tuesday, also known as Shrove Tuesday, Shrovetide, or Mardi Gras, marks the final day of Ordinary Time before the solemn season of Lent commences on Ash Wednesday. This day is synonymous with celebration, often seen as the last opportunity to indulge in rich and indulgent foods before the penitential period of fasting and abstinence during Lent. It is a time for revelry and festivities, with people coming together to enjoy sumptuous meals, delicious treats, and vibrant parades. It serves as a joyful farewell to the carefree days of Ordinary Time, emphasizing the imminent spiritual journey of self-reflection and preparation for Easter. Fat Tuesday this year is on **February 13**, 2024.

The traditional name of Fat Tuesday is Shrove Tuesday. Shrove is derived from the word shrive and means absolve. Catholics should spend time examining their conscience as they prepare for the penitential season of Lent. It's a great time to reflect on areas where spiritual growth is needed. Catholic churches burn the palms used during the previous year's Palm Sunday in preparation for the ashes distributed on Ash Wednesday the next day.

The colors purple, green, and gold are associated with Mardi Gras celebrations. Purple represents justice, green represents faith, and gold represents power. These colors were chosen by the Rex, the King of the Mardi Gras parade in New Orleans, Louisiana in 1892. So, while it's fun to decorate with these colors there is not a connection within Catholicism.

While tasty foods are traditional on Fat Tuesday they can vary from culture to culture. Donuts and pancakes are common, as are Polish Pączki. Mardi Gras King Cakes are also popular. In New Orleans, so many families eat jambalaya, gumbo, étouffée, red beans and rice, and other Cajun dishes.



Stop the Traffic

Saint Josephine Bakhita's feast day is February 8. She is the first black female saint of the modern era, and was beatified on May 17 in 1992, part of a push within the Catholic Church to honor both black Catholics and to signify the horrors of human trafficking. This practice, also known as modern slavery, accounts for the bondage of an estimated 50 million people today, spread over every continent and present in every country. Bakhita herself was kidnapped as a child in Sudan and later held against her will in Italy before essentially suing for freedom in 1889 and becoming a nun. Her legacy is now global, as she is the patron of all human trafficking survivors. May she inspire us to recognize the silent suffering of so many and work for the freedom of all God's children.
