Is God Paying Attention?

When storms rage without and within, and we are beset with dread and frantic activity, we often find ourselves wondering, "Is God paying attention?" Today we learn that God indeed pays attention. Today we learn of the God who is beyond and of God who is here. We discover that the God who created the boundaries of the sea is within the raging seas that sometimes threaten us. We ponder troubles and we learn trust. We are drawn to consider that we are one with the Lord of all time and trouble. We are one with Christ who has died for all and lives for all, and we are all new creations in a world freshly ordered. This trust and faith steadies our ship and calms our seas. We have some surety now, even as we continue to move our small ships through treacherous waters. We can take on life's journey with its troubles and its peace, for Christ indeed is here and attentive to us, whether or not we are likewise so mindful. As God's own people, we cannot expect to slip through life as small skiffs on glassy seas. But we can expect God to be right there with us, inside and outside.

Nativity of Saint John the Baptist-June 24

In St. Luke's Gospel, we read that a righteous priest named Zechariah and his wife Elizabeth were old and childless. One day Zechariah was fulfilling his duties burning incense in the temple and the archangel Gabriel came and told him his wife would bear a son who would prepare the people to receive the Lord. Gabriel told him to name the boy John. Zechariah doubted that his wife could conceive in her old age, and was struck mute. As Gabriel foretold, Elizabeth became pregnant, and when she gave birth, Zechariah wrote on a tablet that the boy would be named John, and Zechariah's mouth was opened. He was filled with the Holy Spirit and immediately sang the praises of God.

A prophet isn't necessarily someone who forewarns of future events. Biblically, a prophet can also be an inspired teacher of the word of God. By our baptism, we are all called to be prophets. Today, dwell on these words of Zechariah, then pray to the Holy Spirit to help you be a prophet: "you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give his people knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins."

St. Irenaeus of Lyons—June 28

St. Irenaeus of Lyons was born in modern-day Turkey around the year 130. Not much is known about the early life of this Father of the Church, so his story begins when he became a disciple of St. Polycarp, who himself was a disciple of St. John the Evangelist. St. Irenaeus was ordained and served the Church of Lyons in present-day France as a priest, then as a bishop. His evangelistic

(**St. Irenaeus** cont.) efforts saw him write five books against many heresies, including Montanism and Gnosticism, and he is considered the first Christian theologian to develop a system of theology. He was among the first to call Mary "The New Eve" and in all his writings he shows not just a Marian devotion, but an assumption that Mary's helping role in salvation was common knowledge among Christians.

St. Irenaeus of Lyons wrote, "the knot of Eve's disobedience was loosed by the obedience of Mary." Many times, our lives can seem like a complicated mess, and it's easy to feel "knotted up." Today, bring the biggest tangle of your life to "Mary, Undoer of Knots" and trust in her intercession.






Summer Reading
