The Second Week of Advent— Peace

Peace is more than just the absence of war; it's a spiritual state defined as the "tranquility of order" which stems from a life lived in accordance with God's will and love. This inner peace

is a gift from God that can exist even amid external turmoil, and it's cultivated through prayer, aligning one's will with God's, and actively working to be a peacemaker in the world through actions like forgiveness and caring for the marginalized.

Key aspects of peace

- Tranquility of order: The Catholic Church teaches that true peace is "the tranquility of order," as defined by St. Augustine. This means peace is an internal state achieved when one's life is directed toward God and ordered by virtue and love.
- Not merely the absence of conflict: The peace that Christ gives is different from the peace the world offers, which is often dependent on circumstances. Peace from Jesus is an inner state that can be maintained even during suffering or conflict because it is rooted in faith, not external conditions.
- A gift from God: Peace is seen as a divine gift that one receives and cultivates through prayer, faith, and a relationship with God. It is a peace that can be experienced when one entrusts all circumstances to the Lord.

- A call to peacemaking: Catholics are called to be peacemakers in their own lives and in the world. This involves inner work like disarming negative attitudes, practicing forgiveness, and showing care for those on the margins of society.
- The "Sign of Peace" in Mass: The exchange of peace during the liturgy is a prayer for the unity and peace of the Church and a physical representation of this spiritual reality. It is meant to be a sincere moment of fraternal love and unity, a foretaste of Christ's peace.
- Achieved through spiritual disciplines: Practices such as prayer, fasting, and converting one's heart toward peace are essential Christian tools for achieving peace. Sacramental objects and practices, such as using holy water or St. Benedict medals, can also aid in seeking a calmer disposition.
- Forgiveness and reconciliation: A key part of building peace is practicing forgiveness toward those who have offended you. This aligns with the idea of reconciliation and is central to the "Sign of Peace" exchanged in the Mass.
