#### **Into Our Homes**

Over the course of the past year, we have been nourished at the table of God's word and feasted on the Gospel

of Saint Luke. We have listened to parables, been summoned to take up our crosses and follow Christ, and been schooled in the way of discipleship. Since the beginning of Advent, the Church has turned our attention to Matthew's Gospel. Today Matthew opens the doors of Saint Joseph's house, as well as his dreams, and tells the story of the events leading up to Jesus' birth. The final line of today's Gospel is worth noting: "When Joseph awoke, he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took his wife into his home." Today is a day to consider our devotion to and appreciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary in our faith lives. Today is a day for us to take her into our homes.

#### **Preparing a Place for Christ's Birth**

Mary stands as a reminder that nothing is impossible with God. This young woman's life was thrown into confusion when the angel announced that she, although a virgin, would be the mother of God's Son. She is the one to whom we can look when our lives are thrown into confusion. She gave herself over to the power of God. This did not mean that she would live her life free from fear and pain. We all know the rest of the story—how she would watch her son suffer and die. Mary is a source of comfort for all who have lost children. We can look to her for comfort in times of grief and pain. How fitting that we focus on the Virgin Mary on this final Sunday of Advent. When we open the doors of our hearts and welcome Mary into our lives, what we really do is prepare a place where the Lord is born to us again.



# Sunday, December 20/21, 2025 Fourth Sunday of Advent

**Reading I:** *Isaiah 7:10-14*—The virgin shall be with child.

**Responsorial:** *Psalm 24*—Let the Lord enter; he is king of glory.

Reading II: Romans 1:1-7—Jesus is the

son of David and the Son of God.

**Gospel:** *Matthew 1:18-24*—Joseph, son of David, have no fear about taking Mary as your wife.

#### The Fourth Week of Advent-Love

he fourth week of Advent focuses on **Love**, representing God's ultimate gift of His Son, Jesus, to humanity, fulfilling His promise and demonstrating unconditional love. It ties together the themes of Hope, Peace, and Joy, encouraging believers to reflect on God's love for them and to share that love with others through acts of kindness, compassion, and service, preparing their hearts for Christ's arrival. It's symbolized by lighting the fourth Advent candle, often purple, sometimes called the "Angel's Candle," recalling the angels' message of peace and goodwill, uniting hope, peace, and joy into the central theme of God's boundless love.

#### **Key Meanings of Advent Week 4:**

- God's Greatest Gift: Jesus' birth is seen as God's supreme act of love for the world (John 3:16).
- Transformation: This love calls us to change, opening our hearts to receive and embody divine love.
- A Call to Action: It prompts us to love God and love others, especially the marginalized, through acts of compassion.

#### Symbolism:

- **Candle:** The fourth candle, often purple, is lit, joining the candles for hope, peace, and joy.
- Central Candle: A white Christ Candle, representing Jesus, is often lit on Christmas Eve, symbolizing the pure light of God entering the world.

#### **Reflection & Prayer:**

Meditate on God's unconditional love and how to extend that love to your family, community, and world.

# Choose Light

#### Thank You For Being the Light

he Star of the Valley Advent reflection and Christmas gathering was a great success with close to 60 people attending. Our own parishioner, Marcy Fox, and Sister of St. Joseph of Carondelet, Joann Heinritz created a beautiful and inspirational Advent reflection centered on the theme of "Choose Light." They were accompanied by Maryellen Birkland who played the organ.

Sister Joann talked about how light was a powerful image throughout history in all religions and how often light was used in the Old and New Testaments. She emphasized that we must be open to the light, and also work at being the light to those around us. She stated how the bible teaches us that darkness can never overpower light.

Marcy told several stories involving light—how it has changed lives and even history. One story was especially powerful about a young black boy from South Africa who had been taught to always allow white people to pass on the sidewalk while he stepped aside into the street to let them pass. However, one day a white man came towards him who first stepped off the sidewalk and let the young black boy and his mother go first, showing them respectful deference. The young boy turned to his mother and questioned her. His mother said that the man was a Man of God. That young boy responded saying he wanted to grow up to be a Man of God. The young boy was the young Bishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa. The young boy was shown light and he in turn became light for the whole world, and changed a nation.

Following Sister Joann and Marcy's reflection, we all gathered in the Msgr. Fahey Parish Center for a lively and entertaining musical program performed by the "Mello-Tones," including Mary Ellen Brown on accordion, John Derby on bass ukulele, Bob Chapman on guitar, and Marisa Malvin as vocalist. A highlight of the Christmas program was the Christmas Trivia game, hosted by Joanne Phillips, Marcy Fox's sister. Everyone had a great time trying to answer trivia questions such as "what state has a town call Santa Claus?" (Indiana), or "how many Christmas cards are mailed each year in the United States?" (3.1 billion). We ended our Christmas party with a sing-along of old favorite Christmas carols led by the Mello-Tones.

A huge thank you to Marcy Fox and Sister Joann Heinritz, who spent many hours putting together a thoughtful and inspirational program, to Maryellen Birkland for her organ music, to Joanne Phillips, who hosted the fun and challenging Christmas trivia game, and to the Mello-Tones for their lively musical program.
