The Chosen Remnant

Zephaniah is one of the least-known of the Old Testament prophets. He speaks in today's first reading of impending judgment. But the Lord will leave a "remnant" in Israel. This image of a remnant, or remainder, was to become vital to both Judaism and Christianity.

Paul's letter to Corinth makes obvious his deep concern for the Christians there. They are too self-confident, he says, too sure of themselves. He admonishes them to remember that Christ has given them all they have.

Today's Gospel comprises the opening of Jesus' "Great Sermon." As God gave Moses the law on Sinai, so now Jesus gathers his disciples on a hillside to teach them the new law. Each of these Beatitudes contrasts the humiliation of the present with the glory of the future: poverty vs. the riches of God's kingdom, hunger for holiness vs. fulfillment in the Spirit, persecution vs. the reign of God. Jesus is here speaking to God's chosen "remnant."

Remnant

Remnant: Noun 1. A fragment or scrap. 2. Something remaining leftover, used or not.

These definitions suggest that a remnant is not anything significant, or is not anything of much value. Some may even consider remnants as easily disposable, and put them in the trash. I'm glad that Jesus didn't think this.

How do you view your "remnant" self?

Can remnants be put to good use?

Just imagine how impactful it is when remnants of cloth are joined together to produce a patchwork quilt that keeps someone warm. In unity there is power.

Be an active remnant, joining others for good results.

Gospel: *Matthew 5:1-12a*—Blessed are the lowly, the sorrowing, the poor in spirit.

Jubilee Year of St. Francis—1/10/2026–1/10/2027

The Pope has given us a joyful and unexpected gift: the proclamation of a Jubilee Year dedicated to the beloved Saint Francis of Assisi.

This gift of grace comes on the heels of the Jubilee Year of Hope, which concluded on January 6. That jubilee invited the faithful worldwide into renewal, reconciliation, and pilgrimage—and this new jubilee invites us to embrace the poverty and charity that defined St. Francis.

This latest jubilee—which began on January 10, 2026 and concludes on the same day next year—marks 800 years since the death of Saint Francis.

He was born around 1181, and in a remarkably short life of just 44 years, he transformed the Church through radical fidelity to the Gospel and deep love for the poor. Canonized only two years after his death, his witness of faith and charity has endured for eight centuries.

Saint Francis was the people’s saint. But it’s striking that it took nearly 800 years for a pope to choose his name, which Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio did when he became Pope Francis in 2013. That decision reflected a profound identification with the saint’s embrace of poverty, humility, and dependence on God.

While many saints have lived lives of simplicity, few expressed it as visibly and poetically as Saint Francis. His voluntary poverty and trust in divine providence remain a powerful challenge in a world often defined by excess.

Pope Leo XIV has emphasized that this Jubilee is meant to show how Francis’s way of life—though 800 years old—is just as achievable in modern society. It reminds us (**St. Francis** continued next column.)

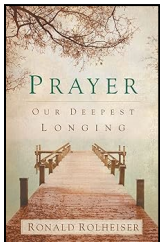

We will have a second collection next weekend, **Feb. 7-8**, for **Parish Repair & Maintenance**. Thank you for your generosity.

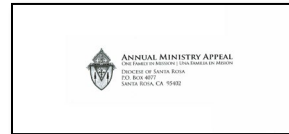


Annual Ministry Appeal 2026
